### CHANGE!

Either you love it, you tolerate it, or you despise it! So, some of you are happy that this congregation has entered a time of significant transition, some are going to tolerate it (wake me when it's over), and others are going to mutter. God created us with many reactions to changing situations. So let's explore our created nature.

Change is built into living. We grow older every day, whether we are age 1, 13, 25, 51, or 76. We don't realize our growing older until one day it smacks us (or our parents) in the face – new shoes, teen-aged reactions, first drivers' license, marriage to the love of our life, grey hairs or wrinkles appearing, walkers and wheelchairs, even death.

We resist when change is thrust upon us. "Lord God, you brought us up out of Egypt and we are eating manna and have no water to drink. WHY?" That was the complaint of the Hebrew people on the journey to the Promised Land. Resisting is not new, even when God is shaping us. We resist when change is not an option but appears as the only option. "I'm too young to die," we cry to God. "But, but, but, we've always done it that way," we cry to each other. Yet the transition through death to life eternal is the goal of Christian living. We love change because it helps us escape the boring, or the untenable, or the seemingly inevitable. Escape is often yearned for when it is possible and not so welcome when it happens.

Our congregation is undergoing change. Sometimes it feels to us like one of the above scenarios; sometimes it feels like we can claim we are Presbyterians: Reformed, always reforming.

What do we mean by Reformed? That descriptor relates to the Reformation, which is a fascinating study of history. The excesses of the Roman Catholic Church got to be too much for the Reformers who wanted to use the language of the people in worship not the way it has been always done with Latin. The Reformers yearned for a church where the people had a say – a true democracy with all its give and take and the responsibility of making choices as a group.

Ministers' responsibilities were curtailed – the Book of Order of the PCUSA gives limited duties to ministers, which are not subject to the authority of the Session: the selection of Scripture lessons to be read; the preparation and preaching of the sermon; the prayers offered on behalf of the people; the music to be sung; the use of drama, dance, and other art forms. We also moderate the Session – note the chosen term – moderate, not direct.

What do we mean by "always Reforming"? It means we are open to God's leadership through Christ and Holy Spirit. So, talk with the Session members about your thoughts about the changes that are happening, most of them naturally, here.

Changing pastors is done in an orderly way according to the Book of Order, which gives presbytery authority since it is where ordained ministers have membership in the Church. If you like or don't like a new hymn, let your ministers know. If you think the choice of material for education is wrong, speak to a member of the Christian Education committee. If you have an idea for the worship service, let the Worship and Music Committee know. Burning to do a certain mission? Speak with the Mission and Outreach Committee. A reforming congregation works because of the feedback of all the people. Elders are elected to represent the people – they need to know.

Yes, change happens and yes, God's fine hand can be seen in many changes.

### MARIALICE'S MUSIC NOTES

On May 20, we will celebrate Pentecost Sunday, the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

One of the beautiful hymns appointed for Pentecost is "Breathe on Me, Breath of God", hymn 286 in **Glory To God**. The text was written by Edwin Hatch (1835-1889). Hatch was born in the English village of Derby and educated at King Edward's School, Birmingham, and Pembroke College, Oxford. He became a member of the Church of England, taking holy orders in 1859, and ministered for three years in London's East End before becoming professor of classics at Trinity College, Toronto, Canada, and rector of Quebec High School. He returned to England and served as vice-principal of St. Mary's Hall and then held several other faculty positions at Oxford University.

The tune for "Breathe on Me, Breath of God" was composed by Robert Jackson in 1894. The tune, TRENTHAM, is named after the small village of Trentham in Staffordshire, England. Robert Jackson (1842-1914) was born in Oldham, Lancashire, England, and studied at the Royal Academy of Music. He was organist at St. Mark's Church, London, and on the death of his father, Jackson took his position as organist and choirmaster at St. Peter's Church, Oldham. Jackson and his father between them served the same St. Peter's Church for almost ninety years.

### FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Recently, a friend gave me a devotional book to add to my daily reading of Oswald Chambers. It is an interesting book titled "Have You Considered: Evidence Beyond a Reasonable Doubt." It is a much lighter read than Chambers but, it is very thought provoking as it looks at nature, history, and some of the sciences. The one I read for the day I wrote this article is under the heading of design.

It is often stated that belief in God is a "leap of faith." Yet, in the Bible, from the Old Testament (Psalm 19:1-4) to the New Testament (Romans 1:18-23), clearly states that the reality of God's existence is absolutely apparent to everyone, everywhere – simply by observing creation. In other words, creation could only exist if a Creator made it.

The September 2013 journal *Science* describes a set of perfectly formed gears at the base of a lowly 2 mm-long leafhopper nymph. This creature has the ability to jump several inches using a mighty thrust from its hind legs that propels the creature with an acceleration of nearly 400 G's (fighter pilots risk blackout if accelerating much past 10 G's). This feat would be equivalent to a man accelerating from 0 to 200 mph in less than a second and jumping 400 feet in a single bound!

What makes the leafhopper's feat even more amazing is that the nerve impulses cannot travel fast enough to allow both legs to push off in a coordinated fashion – meaning that with every hop, the insect should spin out of control. So how did the Creator solve this problem? The Creator added a set of interlocking gears at the base of the leafhopper's legs so that they are forced to move in exact coordination. This design is currently being studied as a prototype for new kinds of high-speed directional gears. The marvels of the microscopic world and the wonders of God's creativity never cease. The belief that such a gear could "make itself" via random changes over time is equivalent to believing a gear could be produced in a machine shop via random hammering of a piece of metal. When we see microscopic gears solving a leafhopper's leap, we stand in awe of our Creator!
