Call to Worship

Once upon a time, there was a little girl who had a terrible day. She left her lunch at home. She skinned her knee on the playground, and no one wanted to sit with her on the bus. So may this fire burn bright, and as it does, may we sing. May we dance. May we laugh. May we hold onto the people we love.

May we sow joy in a hurting world, and may it be an act of holy resistance. Amen.


