My favorite line of Scripture comes out of the readings for this season. "Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart." The account in Luke's telling of the Christmas story contrasts Mary and the shepherds; they came upon the invitation of the angels to see the newborn...the smelly, ragtag sheep watchers. They were frightened by the sudden host in the heavens, then surprised by the invitation; yet they ventured forth to see the newborn (Well, most of them ventured or they took turns because you never, ever leave sheep alone!), and they returned to their fields glorifying and praising God. The comment is that the shepherds went and saw, and it was just as they were told it would be.

Mary, on the other hand, was a new mom, weary from birthing and hardly in a place to entertain company sent by angels. She was also a reflective, pondering sort of gal who kept ideas to herself. After all, women weren't expected to have opinions.

"Pondering" sets a tone of openness to a variety of interpretations and meanings. Rolling something around in one's mind is praised; finding meanings under the surface meaning is relished. We don't hear much more about Mary until she is at the foot of the cross – what is she pondering at the crucifixion of her son?

So now I ask you, how does Mary's example of pondering relate to the experiences of today at Grace First Church? Life changed dramatically for Mary; it has also changed for our congregation. If you have a few moments here and there, ponder. Reflect on the way things have been and the possibilities for how it can be.

In early January your officers and your pastors will be meeting to plan the future for this congregation. Please share your thoughts, your hopes, and your dreams with them. Our officers are very dedicated to listening to our congregation as they seek to find God's way into the future – the two concepts of listening and stepping forward are deeply related. Exercise your faith this season and allow yourself to ponder. Ah, the depths of joy!

Reflections Psalm 104

"Time to reflect." That would be my answer to the question: "What do you like most about the end of the year?" Time to stand in front of a full-length mirror of memory and study the scene. Thoughtfully. Silently. Alone. To trace the outline of the past without the rude interruption of routine tasks. Taking time to stop and listen...and think.

Invariably, those occasions leave me feeling grateful to God. Often, I end up thanking Him for something or someone specifically that He provided in the yesterday of my life that makes my today much more meaningful.

The Giving Tree written by Phil Silverstein is a simple, fanciful piece about a tree that loved a boy. And yet it caused me to pause and take a moment.

When the boy was young, he swung from the tree's branches climbed all over her, ate her apples, slept in her shade. Such happy, carefree days. The tree loved those years. But as the boy grew, he spent less and less time with the tree. "Come on, let's play," invited the tree on one occasion, but the young man was interested in money. "Take my apples and sell them," said the tree. He did, and the tree was happy. He didn't return for a long time, but the tree smiled when he passed by one day. "Come on, let's play!" But the man was older and tired of his world. He wanted to get away from it all. "Cut me down. Take my large trunk and make yourself a boat. Then you can sail away," said the tree. The man did, and the tree was happy. Many seasons passed – and the tree waited. Finally, the old man returned, too old and tired to play, to pursue riches, or to sail the seas. "I have a pretty good stump left, my friend. Why don't you just sit down here and rest?" said the tree. He did, and the tree was happy.

How many Giving Trees have there been in our lives? How many have released part of themselves so that we might grow, accomplish goals, find wholeness and satisfaction? How many times have we been Giving Trees to others? Take time to thank God for the many people who have come into your life.

As Christmas approaches, we face many choices regarding shopping, schedules and more. In addition to consumer dilemmas, we are faced with spiritual dilemmas. On one hand, we want to observe Advent and wait for the Christ child. On the other, we want to shop and wrap and bake — and we run ourselves ragged in the process.

The following ideas from the Presbyterian Hunger Program are designed to help Presbyterians celebrate the birth of Christ in more meaningful ways than mainstream culture provides. Incorporate one, two or all of these ideas into your holiday celebrations. Share with family and friends. And when the holidays are over, turn these ideas into 2018 resolutions.

CARING FOR SELF AND OTHERS

Pray and Renew

Holidays can be a great time to teach, learn and write new prayers. Consider your family's everyday prayer life, too. Rotate who prays before each meal from person to person, year to year, so everyone has an opportunity to pray.

Tell Stories

Encourage questions and conversations about holiday traditions past and present. Discuss the origin of traditions as you engage in them. Retell the story of the birth of Christ as you set a Nativity scene.

Remember

Take time to remember loved ones who have passed on. Recall stories to honor each one. If you have experienced a recent loss, allow time to grieve and care for yourself. Reach out to those you know are mourning or missing someone special this season.

Retreat and Rest

Treat yourself to quiet time and a change of pace. Incorporate prayer, views of nature, art — whatever feeds your soul and engenders holy rest in this holy season.

Share Talents

Give the gift of your talents to loved ones this year. If you have a knack for crafts, music or dance, pass that knowledge along. Gifting a series of lessons empowers the people you love with new skills while passing on traditions and heritage.
