We pray that this season of reflection and repentance will lead us to new and abundant life.


Come, let us open ourselves to the power of the Holy Spirit.

Call to Confession





Call to Stewardship


Out of our great love and gratitude for God, we bring our tithes and offerings. With joy let us gather and dedicate our gifts.
